CANADA DAY

Prior to 1982, Canada's national holiday was known and celebrated as Dominion Day. Then in 1982 this celebration was renamed 'Canada Day.' The history of Canada isn't splattered with a ton of wars and bloodshed, unlike many other countries. Throughout the later part of the 19th century, the unification of the British North American colonies was discussed and on July 1, 1867, the British Parliament brought the British North America Act into effect, thus creating an independent Canada. The Dominion territories which had previously been Upper and Lower Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, after the British North American Act was passed became Quebec and Ontario, paving the way for 'neighboring colonies' to join in the future, leading to what we know as present-day Canada. Up until 1982, the British North America Act served as the constitution for Canada.

Although established in 1879, Dominion Day was not widely celebrated. Many Canadians viewed themselves as British citizens. It was not until 50 years later, in 1917 when Dominion Day was fully embraced and recognized by most Canadians. By 1967 on the 100th anniversary of the creation of Canada, with an increased sense of patriotism, that unofficial celebrations of 'Canada Day' had began, with the adoption of the official name-change in 1982.

Canadians commemorate Canada Day every July 1st through a variety of celebratory activities organized by the federal, provincial, and municipal governments, which include community celebrations that provide free picnic food, drink, cupcakes, and elaborate fireworks shows. Neighborhoods, communities, and families get together and celebrate the birth of Canada as an independent country. Canadians living abroad also gather and celebrate Canada's birthday with other Canadians. Overall, this national holiday allows for family and community celebrations.

NEWS: The Canadian Government has Set a Date to Ban Some Single-Use Plastics.

Maintaining its focus on its protection of the environment, the Canadian government has banned the imports of single use plastics amongst other environmental threats to the environment. Culprits such as "Styrofoam cups, take-away containers and plastic bags are to be done away by the end of 2022. Banning their sale by the end of next year and their export by the end of 2025". Although these measures had been anticipated for some time, the government's actions have been slow in coming, no doubt due to push back from manufacturers and distributors. These delays in banning these harmful products have disappointed many environmentalists.

Canada's Environmental Protection Act's list of toxic plastics being released last year has paved the way for the creation of new regulations banning some of the worst offenders. Environment Minister, Steven Guilbeault, has recently announced that the work leading towards a ban of single-use plastics has resumed. Within the timeline of these plans, it was established that by the end of this year, companies will be prohibited from importing or manufacturing plastic bags and Styrofoam takeout containers. Likewise, by the end of next year its sale will be prohibited and by the year 2025, its export would be banned. In addition to bags and takeout boxes, the ban will also affect plastic straws, cutlery, stir sticks and six-pack rings.

Although this is excellent news for our environment, understandably, there is much unhappiness and opposition being expressed by plastic producers and local plastic distributors.



DUAL CITIZENSHIP

Through different parameters and regulations, some countries offer its citizens dual citizenship. Although having two nationalities is relatively common, many people are unaware that this is an option for them. Canada is one of the many countries that allows dual citizenship. Rules and regulations around dual citizenship determine eligibility.

Below is some basic information and a list of Spanish-speaking countries that allow dual nationality. Detailed information can be obtained by the individual consulates and embassies of the specific country.


