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Two scandals, 27 medals: How Canada performed at these Olympics



According to the National Post, Canada had a successful performance at the Paris 2024 Olympics, winning 27 medals across 15 sports, including nine golds, seven silvers, and 11 bronzes. This achievement exceeded the previous total from Tokyo 2020. Highlights included victories in hammer throw, pole vault, and relay races, with standout performances from athletes like Summer McIntosh, who won three golds and a silver in swimming. However, the games were also marred by two scandals: a soccer drone scandal involving unethical actions by the former coach Bev Priestman, and the revocation of accreditation for Andre De Grasse's coach, Rana Reider, due to safety concerns.

The Canadian Olympic Committee CEO, David Shoemaker, acknowledged the negative impact of the scandals but praised the athletes for their resilience and performance. The committee aims to work with Canada Soccer to conduct an external review of the issues. Despite these challenges, the team was commended for their achievements, with Own The Podium's CEO, Anne Merklinger, highlighting Canada's ability to excel despite international funding discrepancies.

Shoemaker expressed hope that the games would inspire future generations and lead to increased government support for sports. While not all Canadians are focused on sports, many took pride in Team Canada's accomplishments. The focus now shifts to preparing for the next Olympics in Italy, just 544 days away.



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'Humanitarian crisis': Ontario cities beg province to create new ministry for homelessness



According to Global News, Ontario's Big City Mayors have launched a campaign at Queen's Park urging the provincial government to create a dedicated ministry to address the homelessness crisis in the province. With the growing number of encampments and rising issues of opioid addiction, local governments are struggling to manage without adequate resources. The mayors describe the situation as an unprecedented humanitarian crisis affecting municipalities across Ontario.

The Association of Municipalities of Ontario reports that over 1,400 homelessness encampments were established last year in both small towns and large cities. The mayors argue that while municipalities did not create this crisis, they are forced to manage it without the necessary tools and resources. They are calling on Premier Doug Ford to appoint a minister responsible for housing, mental health, and addiction, emphasizing the need for a coordinated response.

The mayors also propose the creation of a task force to strategize on addressing homelessness and moving people out of encampments. The campaign, titled "Solve the Crisis," seeks to hold the provincial government accountable and urges federal support. The mayors stress that inaction could lead to more deaths, unsafe public spaces, and business closures. The campaign has received support from the Canadian Mental Health Association and encourages public involvement through a dedicated website.



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Canada wants to be in the top 10 global tourism destinations — but it's struggling to get there



According to a CBC News report, Canada aims to be among Additionally, domestic travel has rebounded to prethe top ten global tourism destinations but faces significant challenges. Despite ambitious post-pandemic goals and a government hopes to leverage Canada's rising immigration new strategy, the country is hindered by geopolitical tensions, high travel costs, and climate change. These factors complicate its recovery on the World Economic Forum's Travel and Tourism Development Index, where it fell to 13th place in 2021, improving slightly to 11th in 2024.

The Canadian government aims to increase tourism revenue from \$140 billion to \$160 billion and boost the sector's contribution to the GDP by 40%. Experts like Frederic Dimanche, director of the Ted Rogers School of Hospitality and Tourism Management, emphasize that Canada needs to enhance its infrastructure, including transportation and accommodation, and focus on attracting more international visitors. Geopolitical tensions, particularly with China, are a maior barrier. as Canada is not on China's list of approved tour destinations. This omission severely impacts the influx of tourists from East Asia, a crucial market for Canada's tourism growth strategy.

pandemic levels, but foreign tourism has not. The rates to encourage more visits from family and friends abroad and to tap into the growing interest in Indigenousbased tourism. However, the cost of traveling within a vast country like Canada remains a challenge, especially given the lack of rapid rail options and competitive airline pricing. Tourism Minister Soraya Martinez Ferrada acknowledges these issues but stresses the importance of tourism as an economic driver that supports 1.9 million jobs nationwide. The government's strategy includes investing in transportation infrastructure and fostering better international relations to improve tourist numbers. Despite the obstacles, there is optimism that with focused efforts on building international relationships and showcasing Canada's unique attractions, the country can achieve its tourism ambitions.



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Bank of Canada is now less concerned that rate cuts will drive up home prices



Global News states that The Bank of Canada is now less worried about a spike in home prices as it continues to lower its benchmark interest rate, according to minutes from the governing council's latest meeting on July 24. During this meeting, the bank delivered its second consecutive quarter-point rate cut. The central bank's policymakers discussed various risks to inflation and the broader Canadian economy, including immigration, wage pressures, and the housing market. Previously, the Bank of Canada had been cautious about reducing rates too quickly, fearing it might drive home prices higher and undermine progress on controlling inflation. However, the latest minutes indicate that these concerns have diminished. Although potential factors, such as declining mortgage rates and population growth, could still increase housing demand, the impact has been muted so far, with slower-than-expected resale activity.

Despite hopes for increased residential building investment next year, the bank anticipates a persistent imbalance between housing demand and supply, particularly in urban rental markets. The governing council also noted the potential for continued upward pressure on rents if housing affordability issues

persist.

The Bank of Canada expects the unemployment rate to remain elevated as the labor force grows faster than employment. Although wage growth remains a concern for inflation, the council is confident that wages will moderate as the job market slackens. The central bank indicated a consensus that further rate cuts would be appropriate if inflation trends towards the 2% target. Analysts from BMO and CIBC anticipate additional rate cuts in 2024.



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Alberta's Icefields Parkway, Highway 16 to partially reopen following wildfire closure



According to CBC News, Alberta's Icefields Parkway and Highway 16 are gradually reopening after being closed due to wildfires in Jasper National Park. Highway 16 will open daily from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m., but conditions may change without notice. Stopping on the highway is prohibited, and entry into the Jasper townsite remains restricted. The southern section of the Icefields Parkway will also partially reopen, allowing access between Saskatchewan Crossing and the Icefield Centre.

The closures were initially implemented two weeks ago when massive wildfires threatened the park, leading to evacuations and the destruction of many structures in Jasper. While the fire still burns and continues to pose a threat, certain areas, like the Columbia Icefield, are reopening to visitors. However, most trails and campgrounds in Jasper National Park remain closed.

Officials urge visitors to exercise extreme caution due to limited safety resources and the potential for delayed emergency responses. Evacuees have been given limited access to the park to assess damage, with bus tours organized for residents and business owners. Efforts to allow residents to return are ongoing, but no date has been set for re-entry. The community mourns the loss of a firefighter from Calgary who died combating the blaze. Despite the challenges, there is hope and determination to rebuild and return home soon.



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What is required to bring a dog into the U.S. from Canada starting Aug. 1



Global News reports, that new strict border rules for bringing dogs into the U.S. from Canada will come into effect on August 1, 2024. These rules require that dogs entering the U.S. be at least six months old. Owners must complete paperwork for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) before their visit, which will confirm that the dog is healthy, has a valid microchip, and is vaccinated against rabies. The documentation varies depending on where the dog was vaccinated and the countries it has been in the last six months.

The CDC advises that the Import Dog Form be filled out online between two and ten days before arrival, though it can be completed closer to the border crossing if internet access is available. The form also requires a clear photo of the dog's face and body, taken within ten days of arrival for dogs under one-year-old. These measures aim to control the spread of rabies, as the U.S. eliminated dog rabies in 2007, but it remains uncontrolled in over 100 countries.

For dogs from Canada, a low-risk country for rabies, owners need one of the following: a certification form endorsed by an official veterinarian, including valid rabies serology titer or veterinary records for the past six months; a foreign rabies vaccination and microchip certification; a U.S.-issued rabies vaccination certification endorsed by the USDA; a valid USDAendorsed export health certificate; or a foreign export certificate listing the dog's microchip number and veterinary records from the last six months. These documents must be completed within 30 days before arrival and are valid for either a single or multiple entries depending on the vaccination details.
